

FIRST RE-ESTABLISHMENT

GCDB 600600

Section corner common to Section 1, 2, 11 and 12, Township 34 South, Range 1 West, W.M.
 $V = 19\frac{1}{2}^\circ$

From the following evidence at the location described below, I set a 1x36-inch G.I. pipe 26 ins. in the ground with a 2½ ins. bronze disc marked:

Original BTs marked by Ives and Hyde in 1854, found as follows:

- A Ponderosa Pine snag, now 25-inch diameter, and 10 feet high with burnt face containing scribed "1" and "S", bears $N16^\circ W$, 18.5 feet to face of blaze. Record, $N22^\circ W$, 18.48 feet.
- A Black Oak shell, approximately 12-inch diameter, with a live tree connected, reverse "BT" scribe found in dead and down portion, bears record $N65^\circ E$, 54.12 feet to estimated face of blaze.
- Ponderosa Pine stob, 12-inch diameter, and about 15 feet high, with portion lying alongside scribed "T S 1 BT" in burnt face, bears record, $S43^\circ E$, 52.8 feet to estimated face of blaze.
- Ponderosa Pine remains found at record location of S.W. BT
- Ponderosa Pine line tree now a 25-inch diameter snag, about 10 feet high with 3 notches on South face, bears record North, 22.44 feet.

I mound stones around corner, marked the following trees C.S. BT and take measurements to center of trees at lower blaze:

- Black Oak, 6-inch diameter, bears $N21\frac{1}{2}^\circ E$, 24.5 feet.
- A Douglas Fir, 10-inch diameter, bears $S76^\circ W$, 18.5 feet.
- Douglas Fir, 9-inch diameter, bears $S42^\circ E$, 12.0 feet.
- Douglas Fir, 6-inch diameter, bears $N32\frac{1}{2}^\circ W$, 23.6 feet.
